

BMPG Support to Military and Aviation Museums

The BMPG have supported a number of museums in their work to restore and preserve Bloodhound MKII items. Advice and guidance is always available and where possible items have been sourced to complete or enhance a Bloodhound MKII exhibit. The following are examples of equipment supplied.

The Muckleburgh Collection

The Muckleburgh Collection have a Bloodhound MKII missile but no launcher to display the missile in an elevated position. The BMPG became aware of two surplus launchers at the BL-64 Museum in Switzerland and were able to secure these and organise their recovery to the UK.

The North East Aviation Museum (NEAM)

NEAM received the second launcher recovered from Switzerland but in this case it was to display a Bloodhound MKI missile.

Bristol Aero Collection Trust (BACT)

A set of missile Fuze aerials for the Bristol Aero Collection to make their Bloodhound MKII missile externally complete (the only one in the UK to have Fuze aerials fitted)

A complete set of launcher sub-assemblies to enable BACT to restore their Bloodhound MKII Launcher to operating condition.

Norfolk and Suffolk Aviation Museum (NASAM)

The BMPG recovered and supplied two aerials for NASM's Bloodhound MKII Radar Type 86. When received by NASAM the Type 86 radar was incomplete, missing the 'in-flight reference' aerial and the 'jamming assessment' aerial.

The supplying of these two aerials made the NASAM Type 86 complete. An important task as the Type 86 at NASAM is the only original RAF Bloodhound MKII radar to survive.
